Rector's Message

The strength of the Michaelhouse community was so clearly evident over the Old Boys' Weekend, as we warmly welcomed Old Boys from around the world to Balgowan for the annual Gaudy weekend.

On the Thursday evening we were honoured to host **Mark Suzman (Pascoe, 1985)**, Rhodes Scholar, Harvard graduate, and CEO of the Gates Foundation. Under his leadership, the Foundation continues its mission to help people to live a healthy, productive life. In his inspiring address to the boys, Mark shared insights from his remarkable journey in global philanthropy and offered a vision for tackling some of the world's most pressing health challenges over the next two decades—including HIV, malaria, tuberculosis, and, very significantly, breast cancer.

Another highlight of the weekend was the prestigious St. Michael's Award ceremony on the Friday evening. This honour is bestowed upon Michaelhouse Old Boys who exemplify outstanding leadership, service, and commitment in line with the school's core values of courage, compassion, humility and integrity, and was proudly made, amongst others, to **Professor Kit Vaughan (Founders, 1970)**.

Professor Vaughan is a globally recognised authority in the biomechanics of human locomotion and has made pioneering contributions to medical science, most notably through his development of a revolutionary 3D ultrasound device. Portable and powered by the latest advances in artificial intelligence, this life-saving technology is designed to improve early breast cancer detection and extend its reach to millions of women in rural communities.

Considering the fact that the two distinguished guests had not previously met each other, the occasion provided a pivotal moment of the weekend, where the two Old Boys, global leaders in their respective fields, were introduced to each other in a special meeting on the banks of Meadows, where they came together for a profound and potentially **important conversation in the international context**. They

discussed cutting-edge innovations in breast cancer detection, with a focus on Professor Vaughan's portable, AI-driven diagnostic device and the role of philanthropic support in ensuring its global accessibility.

This remarkable opportunity not only showcased the extraordinary global impact of our Old Boy community but also stood as a testament to the strong bonds, meaningful networks, and shared purpose of the Michaelhouse brotherhood, spanning generations and disciplines.

Co-Curricular and Individual Achievements

Cricket

Daniel Rees (E Block Baines) recently took part in the prestigious XPL Cricket Tournament, held over the past few weekends at St Charles College and the Pietermaritzburg Oval. A highlight on the cricketing calendar, the tournament features 16-over innings and attracts over 200 of the top players from across KwaZulu-Natal, spanning various age groups.

Daniel played for the AET Sharks in the U15 division. The Sharks emerged as tournament champions, with Daniel earning both the **Best U15 Batsman** and **U15 Player of the Tournament** titles. He also made history by setting a new National Premier League (NPL) record for the highest-ever individual score across all age groups—an extraordinary 172 not out off just 49 balls. This feat broke a national record that had stood for over 12 years. Across his 9 innings, Daniel achieved a match average of 111.2, a strike rate of 271, and scored 48 fours and 51 sixes. He also contributed with the ball, taking 7 wickets.




Two Schools in Concert - 19 June

Michaelhouse Community Partnership Trust

Saturday 7 June was a happy day for the Michaelhouse Community as the Khulakahle ECD Centre was officially opened in Zenzane Village where many of our staff reside. It will serve about fifty 2-3 year-olds as they ready themselves for Primary School. It is well known that the 1000 days of preschooling where essential numeracy, literacy, motor and social skills are developed is a critical component for ongoing education, the absence of which will result in considerable learning deficits and difficulties.

The Michaelhouse CPT in recent times has expanded its reach to include seven ECD centres that serve the 10 primary and 6 secondary schools in our 'footprint'. Until recently Zenzane Village where Asithuthuke Primary and Secondary Schools are located had no viable ECD centre.

And sadly, currently Lions River has no Centre with most toddlers staying at home or being taken by taxi to Howick or Lidgetton.

To help in this area, Steuart Pennington (East, 1988) arranged funding to convert an unused building into a state-of-the-art ECD Centre engaging the community in the refurbishment exercise. The Farfield boys painted the pillars, Old Boys Nick Rogers and Bongani Phakathi donated the jungle gym and David Thorrington-Smith representing the donor, the Eric Thorrington-Smith Family Trust, officially cut the ribbon and pronounced the KhulaKahle (Grow Safely) Centre open as the Zenzane community gathered for celebratory tea and sandwiches. A happy occasion.




Michaelhouse-Hilton Derby Day



Student Led Initiative - Narrativ

During the Michaelhouse Old Boys' Day on 7 June, six boys — **Brent Tayengwa**, **Thomas Wayne**, **Gabe Isabwa**, **Khashane Maenetje**, **Ethan Chiimba**, and **Sihle Ludonga** — launched the very first activation of *Narrativ*, a student-led initiative rooted in the belief that behind every product, every artwork, and every idea, lies a human story worth honouring.

The debut took the form of a curated bronze sculpture exhibition, hosted at the Old Boys' Club in partnership with The Platform Gallery. With 27 artworks on display and over R36,000 raised through sales and donations, the event introduced members of the Michaelhouse community to a different kind of engagement with creativity — one that didn't simply showcase art, but celebrated the artists themselves. Among those featured were renowned local talents such as Sma Tshabalala and Nelson Mchunu, whose works reflected heritage, identity, and personal journey.

But Narrativ is about more than exhibitions. It's about rehumanising creation. In a world of faceless

production and fast consumption, the initiative challenges audiences to ask deeper questions: Who made this? What shaped their voice? And why does it matter? By centering the creator in the experience of the created, *Narrativ* seeks to close the gap between consumer and maker — reminding us that stories carry power, and that people must not be overlooked in the pursuit of product.

Now, *Narrativ* is preparing for its next chapter.

On Saturday, 21 June, during the Hilton-Michaelhouse return derby fixture, the team hopes to host a pop-up stand at Hilton College. Though there will be no formal exhibition this time, the goal is the same: to start meaningful conversations, connect with new communities, and share the vision behind *Narrativ*.

All are encouraged to stop by the stand — whether to learn more, to exchange ideas, or to simply say hello. This is just the beginning, and the team is eager to build something lasting, with others walking alongside them.
