Rector's Message

Just after we broke up for the holidays, we received the news that Mr Brendan Gittins has been appointed Headmaster of Jeppe High School for Boys, starting in January 2026. Brendan has made a great contribution to Michaelhouse and I know how much he has valued and enjoyed his time at Michaelhouse contributing in so many ways in a wide-ranging portfolio encompassing the operation of the school and including an oversight of discipline. He will be sorely missed, but we understand how, as a previous Headboy of Jeppe himself, it is an opportunity that he could not turn down. And so we wish him every success in his new role and hope that he may be in a position to return to us at Michaelhouse at a later stage of his career. A search began immediately for his successor to the role of Deputy Head: Pupils and some progress has been made in this regard. Applications close next Tuesday. So we wish Brendan Gittins, his wife, Charnê and young Jack well as they head north to Johannesburg in December.

Following the enormous success of the C Block Journey, the D Block Pondoland Experience and the E Block Outdoor Education Week, the Michaelhouse campus was a busy place over the holidays with a number of academic activities, music and sports festivals and training camps taking place here. Having a two-week holiday was hugely beneficial to our boys and staff as they also travelled to a variety of different venues for these activities. You will read more about these later in the eNews.

As we move into the Christmas Quarter with exams coming at the end of this term for all Grades, it is important for the boys to sharpen their academic focus. This may require, in some instances, better organisation of their time and a reduction of thought and energy spent on frivolous things. But it should not detract at all from a commitment to those areas in the cultural, sporting and service realms which usually occupy them. It is an absolute fallacy to think that teenage boys can be taken out of their normal programme of all-round activity and achieve success in doing so. Our research at Michaelhouse shows that those who are used to a programme of sport and suddenly stop it decline in their academic performance. The reasons are not only related to the consequences of the reduction of exercise and the adverse effect on their concentration and well-being, but also because they often find that their lives lack all-round purpose without the camaraderie and sense of direction that exists in the sort of activity which allows for a release of energy. I understand that a number of boys in their matric term wish to "give up" sport in order "to work" and this seems to be the common practice in many schools, but our



experience at Michaelhouse is that it is entirely possible and, in fact, easier to maintain one's academic focus at the same time as engaging in the normal activities outside of that focus.

Sharpening academic focus actually means doing simple things well: concentrating in lessons, asking questions when material is not understood, being productive in prep time by consolidating material or getting ahead of the game by exploring the next topic of study, planning revision sessions, meeting deadlines, handing work in on time and, overall, being an active learner. There is the old adage that those who fail to prepare should prepare to fail: boys can create their own success in all spheres of life at Michaelhouse by adopting a dedicated approach in class and in prep, as well as in co-curricular activities and striving to meet the targets which they set for themselves.

Snell Society

The top academic boys in the B Block group were invited to submit a proposal concerning a paper on a particular topic which they are to read at a gathering of their peers and staff under the auspices of the Snell Society. These topics are wide-ranging in nature and, in general, make an interesting commentary on an area which is outside the standard syllabus of any subject followed at Michaelhouse. The boys present an argument over the course of 10-15 minutes on their chosen topic and then answer questions from students and staff.

The purpose of the Snell Society is to prepare pupils for interview situations at top universities or simply to broaden their interests and those of their peers or our TARPS.

Marimba Band

We are delighted that Michaelhouse recently had the honour of hosting the inaugural National High School Marimba Competition on 29 and 30 September. This exciting event brought together 23 talented bands from across the country, showcasing a wide variety of musical styles and performance skills.

Our boys participated enthusiastically, with both the Competition Marimba Band and the Marimba Second Team representing Michaelhouse. The competition was open to both premier bands, who entered in all four main categories, and developing bands, which participated in three or fewer categories. There was also a special section for primary school bands who were keen to play alongside their senior counterparts. The event featured five different categories, with each band presenting pieces from a variety of styles and genres, highlighting the versatility of the African marimba.

A special highlight was the inclusion of a concert by the renowned professional marimba band "Woezor" from Makhanda, which added a wonderful cultural dimension to the event.

This competition not only celebrates musical talent but also reinforces our commitment to preserving and promoting African musical traditions. We are proud of all our students who participated and look forward to seeing this event grow in the years to come. Based on the success of this year's competition, we are pleased to announce that it is set to become a regular feature on the cultural calendar of marimba schools nationwide and the second competition is scheduled for 29 - 30 June 2026.

Water Polo

The Michaelhouse 1st team travelled to Durban for the 20th edition of the prestigious Clifton U19 Water Polo Tournament. Drawn into the formidable "Pool of Death" alongside Hilton College, SACS and KES, the boys faced a tough challenge from the outset.

They opened with a fiery start against Hilton, leading 5-1, but Hilton rallied in the second half to win 14-8. Undeterred, the team bounced back against water polo giants SACS, storming to a 6-1 lead and securing a historic 9-6 victory, Michaelhouse's first ever win over SACS.

Next up was KES, who applied relentless pressure, but Michaelhouse's fitness and composure sealed a 10–8 win, placing them second in Pool D. In the knockout round, we faced Northwood. With just seconds left, Northwood equalised, forcing penalties. Calm finishes from **Nic Smithers**, **Tane Greene**, and **Oliver Guy**, plus clutch saves by **Elliot Springate**, saw Michaelhouse through to the quarterfinals. St John's proved too clinical, and despite a spirited comeback from 9-1 down at halftime, the team lost 12-8. A rematch with SACS followed for a shot at 5th place. At 8-8 at halftime, the game was on a knife's edge, but SACS held firm to win 14-11.

In our final match, Michaelhouse defeated Reddam Constantia 11-7, finishing 7th overall, our best result at this tournament in over a decade. A fitting send-off for the A Blockers, whose dedication and commitment shone throughout.

Special mention must be made of **Elliot Springate** for being selected for the Tournament All Star Team: one of the top 14 players across 16 competing schools.

Michaelhouse hosted the second annual U15 Snow Cup Tournament at the Michaelhouse Aquatics Centre from 26–28 September. Ten teams from across the country — including one from Zimbabwe — took part in this exciting event. Despite the name, the weather was perfect for water polo, with warm temperatures and no rain until the conclusion of the final.



In the pool rounds, the Michaelhouse U14 team (competing as the Invitational Team) produced the upset of the weekend by defeating a very strong King Edward VII School side, securing a spot in the semi-final. Meanwhile, in the other pool, the Michaelhouse U15 team secured a clean sweep of victories, setting up an all-Michaelhouse semi-final against the Invitational Team. The clash lived up to its billing, with both teams showing their quality. The U15s managed to edge ahead in the final chukka to claim a tightly contested 6–4 win.

St Stithians Boys' College were the other in-form side, advancing to the semi-finals against King Edward VII School. In a thrilling, end-to-end match, St Stithian's prevailed by the narrowest of margins, 5–4.

In the 3rd/4th playoff, the Michaelhouse U14s could not repeat their earlier win over King Edward VII School, going down 4–6 and finishing in a commendable 4th place overall — a phenomenal achievement for such a young side.

The gold medal match carried high expectations, and the Michaelhouse U15 team rose to the occasion. After a tight opening half, we pulled away in the final stages to secure a well-deserved 8–5 victory.

Tournament director Mr Justin McDougall congratulated all the teams on their spirit and sportsmanship throughout the weekend, before proudly awarding the Snow Cup trophy to the victorious Michaelhouse U15 team.

Just three days later, the team regrouped for the national U14 tournament at Hilton College. Drawn in the "pool of death" alongside Rondebosch, Kearsney, and Bishops, we performed superbly to end second in the group, including a win over Kearsney (eventual winners). Despite a disappointing semi-final loss to St Stithian's, we bounced back to beat Hilton and Wynberg, finishing 5th nationally out of 20 teams.

vs Bishops lost 5-7 (penalties, 5-5 draw), vs Kearsney College won 12-11 (penalties, 9-9 draw), vs Jeppe won 18-3, vs St Stithians Boys' College (Quarter Final) lost 1-3, vs Hilton College (5th/8th placement) won 5-4 and vs Wynberg (5/6th Playoff) won 4-3.

This group of players continues to impress with their skill, courage, and team spirit — hallmarks of an exciting future for Michaelhouse water polo. Many thanks to Mr Allderman and Mr McDougall for giving up their holidays to accompany the team.

vs Affies - the festival opened with a comprehensive 52-run victory. 
